Downtown Houston has been called one of the three most revitalized urban centers in the West! Since 1995, nearly \$4 billion have been spent on public and private development projects of all kinds downtown. These projects are concentrated in a 1,178-acre area at the heart of an eight-county region with an economic base of \$215.8 billion - larger than that of the countries of Turkey, Austria, and Denmark.

Downtown Houston offers retailers a range of investment opportunities in the heart of the nation's fourth largest city. By 2005, downtown expects annual retail sales to top \$865 million, an increase of more than \$152 million from 2001.

With a diverse population of 4.5 million, the Houston area is expected to continue its phenomenal growth in the coming decades. By 2005, over 5.1 million are expected to live in the greater Houston metropolitan area. Downtown's residential population is expected to increase more than 300 percent.

Talk about quality of life!

It's the standard for development downtown. From new infrastructure to new theaters, residential lofts and major league sports facilities, the benchmark is livability.

It's evident in Main
Street Square, an \$8.9 million
plaza being built on Main,
downtown's original retail
street. The plaza features a
250-foot long pool with a 62
pop jet fountain programmed
to provide a constantly
changing experience. Add
Main Street's new light rail
system and downtown
Houston offers shoppers an
experience unique to our
region.

The billions of dollars invested downtown are almost equally divided between the public and the private sectors. Since 1995, local governments

and agencies have spent nearly \$1 billion on new major league sports stadiums in the fastest buildup of such facilities in modern times. Downtown Houston pulses with life 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

■ Public sector projects in downtown Houston include a \$324 million light rail system that will be running by January 2004, a \$248 million state-of-the-art ballpark with a retractable roof, a \$175 million basketball arena for the Houston Rockets and Comets, a \$265 convention center hotel and a \$165 million expansion of the George R. Brown Convention Center.

■ Private sector projects downtown include an \$88 million performing arts theater, an important addition to downtown's world-renowned Theater District; a five-acre entertainment-themed development with restaurants, a Ferris wheel, an on-site train and aquariums with a total of 500,000

gallons; numerous condo and loft conversions and a flourishing restaurant and club scene.

Employment

There are more than 140,000 employees in downtown Houston. Office workers account for over two-thirds of the downtown work-force. Total employee population in downtown Houston is projected to grow by 7 percent from 2000 to 2005, or by 1.4 percent per year.

Residential

More and more Houstonians are choosing a downtown address. More than 2,400 units are currently located in downtown and more are under construction.

Approximately 3,000 people call downtown home. Over 8,200 new units and townhomes have been built within 1.5 miles of downtown, housing over 10,000 residents.

Hotels

Currently, there are 2,673 hotel rooms in downtown. By 2005, there will be more than 5,000 rooms in downtown Houston, partially due to the increase in hotel visitation by more than 850,000 visitors a year. Hotels currently under construction include the much anticipated 1,200room Hilton Americas Hotel which will be completed this year in between the new arena and the expanded convention center; Courtyard by Marriott and Marriott Residence Inn in the historic Humble Oil Building.

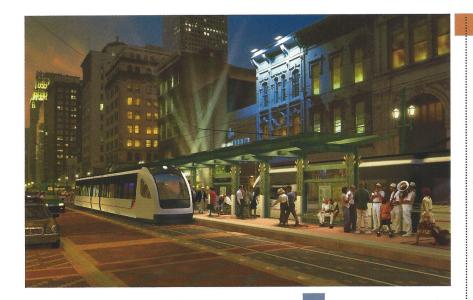

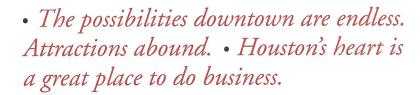


Retail Opportunities
